A DECADE ago The Stoop Fell Race over Haworth Moor attracted around 200 runners but last Sunday it drew a record field of 321 with a further 112 in the junior race.

It is a sign of the times as the 2007 Ben Nevis Race, which accepts 500 entries but which will not actually take place until September 2007, is already full with a waiting list of dozens of frustrated runners.

The Ben, like many pre-entry races, adheres to the crude 'first come, first served' principle.

However, when around one quarter of these entries will not make the start line and Ian Holmes (Bingley), a five times winner and the greatest fellrunner of the past decade, does not get a place because he has not yet applied for a race ten months in advance, the phrase 'Hamlet without the Prince of Denmark' springs to mind.

Ian won The Stoop race for ten consecutive years but last Sunday he was only third in 31.08.

He is now 41 and so generously allowed youngsters Rob Hope (P&B) finishing in 30.12 and Andi Jones (Salford) 30.31 to bask in some of his reflected glory. Horsforth's Alistair Brownlee was missing from the line-up through injury having also missed the European Championships.

First Lady was Natalie White (Bingley) 28th overall in 37.06.

For Skyrac Robert Pritchard and Graham Breeze finished five seconds apart in the 2005 race and on Sunday the gap had stretched to 16 seconds with them finishing in 91st (41.36) and 95th (41.52) respectively with Graham retaining his First V60 status. Malcolm Coles was 191st in 48.12.
